



Pupil Premium and Pupil Premium Plus Funding

The Pupil Premium is funding provided to schools which is additional to main school funding. It is allocated according to the number of pupils on-roll who are eligible for free school meals (FSM), to children of service families, and an allocation for each pupil who has been 'Looked After' (in care) for 6 months or more. In 2012, funding was extended to include pupils who have been eligible for free school meals within the past 6 years.

It is for schools to decide how the Pupil Premium is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility. However, schools are to be held accountable for how they have used the additional funding to support pupils from low-income families. From September 2012, this information must be published on the school website. Please see below for information regarding how the Pupil Premium was spent in the last financial year, the impact of this funding, and the plans for future spending.

Pupil Premium at Croft Church of England Primary School

At Croft we feel that it's the responsibility of our school to support all pupils. We do this by providing high quality classroom teaching supplemented by a variety of interventions as and when required for individuals and small groups.

2018/2019

Our Pupil Premium for **2018/2019** is £41,100. On census day we had 127 children on roll and 19.6% of our pupils are eligible to access support through the grant. This amount includes 4 children eligible for the service child grant and 3 children who receive funding as they are adopted from care.

We have allocated the funding in the following way:

£17,683 (43%) - Pupil Premium Teaching. This budget pays for a qualified teacher to work with our PP children in a one to one or small group session during the school day.

£11,817 (29%) - Lead Teaching Assistant delivering one to one and small group direct support programmes for individual and groups of children to help develop numeracy and literacy skills.

£6500 (17%) TA to deliver counselling and nurture support in the afternoons to individual and vulnerable children to support their emotional well-being. Apprentice TA to work 1:1 with vulnerable child adopted from care in the mornings.

£2500 (6%) - Resources - Funding to buy in additional book, resources and intervention programmes for use in above teaching and learning activities.

£1500 (4%) - Trip Subsidy - Funding for PP to attend class and residential trips at a 50% discount.

£1500 (4%) - Clubs Subsidy - 50%-100% subsidy for breakfast, sporting, musical and academic clubs to allow full participation.

2017/2018

Our Pupil Premium for **2017/2018** was £39,739. We had 93 children on roll and 23.6% of our pupils were eligible to access support through the grant. Two children were in receipt of £300 as a service child.

We used the funding in the following way:

£33206 (83%) - Qualified teacher and Lead Teaching Assistant delivering one to one and small group direct support programmes for individual and groups of children to help develop numeracy and literacy skills. Level 3 TA to deliver counselling and nurture support to individual and vulnerable children to support their emotional well-being. Level 3 TA to deliver afternoon targeted interventions for pupil premium children.

£2202 (6%) - Resources - Funding to buy in additional books, resources and intervention programmes for use in above teaching and learning activities.

£2089 (5%) - Trip Subsidy - Funding for PP to attend class and residential trips at a 50% discount. Impact on social, emotional and resilience of children evident. Wider opportunities.

£1490 (4%) - Clubs Subsidy - 50%-100% subsidy for breakfast, sporting and academic clubs to allow full participation.

£600 - service child grant. Child one received piano lessons, child two received a subscription to Nesy learning to help develop their literacy skills. Both children's funding spend was agreed with their family.

2016/2017

Our Pupil Premium for **2016/2017** was £29,340. We had 106 on roll and 22 of our pupils were eligible to access support through the grant. One other pupil was entitled to £300 as a service child.

We used this funding in the following ways.
